Season's greetings to all Centurions

What an amazing year it has been (yet again!) for Centurions and, as ever, I have taken great pleasure in reporting all the successes of Centurions world wide through my newsletters and on our website.

This year our flagship event, the 100 miles, was held in Redcar and organised by Redcar Race Walking Club led by Centurion Dave Jones. A start list of 30, produced six new Centurions: Colin Vesty C1167 (winner of the RWA 100 miles Championship) Jimmy Milard (NED) C1168; Rob Robertson (USA) C1169; John Borgars C1170; Kim Reed C1171; Gino Masto (BEL) C1172.

The overall winner was Dutch walker Frank van der Gulik in 20:30:56. 1st lady home (4th overall) was Sandra Brown. Existing Centurions placed in the top 10 were: 5th Kevin Marshall and in 8th place, Martin Fisher. Congratulations go to John Borgars who now has the privilege of being the oldest person to complete a British Centurion 100 mile race in 24 hours.

As to the race itself: the heat of Saturday and very strong winds during the night and Sunday morning took it's toll (Ok, so nothing new there!) Additionally, it was not the easiest of courses with our athletes having to negotiate a very busy sea side promenade. There is always a balance (compromise?) to make. Should we hold the race somewhere public to gain maximum publicity, etc, or somewhere quieter such as a park or athletics track tucked away for the benefit of the walkers progress.... Your choice. Let us know your preferences.

Our Dutch and Belgian friends travelled to the race, and once more I would like to take this opportunity to say thank you for your continued enthusiasm and especially to the CVN Secretary Piet Jansen C.389 who has served as CVN Secretary for over fifty years. Your Captain, travelled to Amsterdam in March to join Centurions and their families to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the CVN. They all take great pride in being British Centurions. Piet Janssens has now stepped down and Frans Leijtjens C949 has taken over as Secretary. Our thanks go to both Centurions.

Other Activities and Achievements

Oh so many! Where to start....

Centurions have taken part in races around the country: Enfield, Coventry, Gravesend, Isle of Man, Southend, Guernsey, Lee Valley, Moulton, up north in Manchester, Kirby Fleetham just to mention a few. I know I have said this before, but I do think all walkers owe special thanks to our officials who stand, often in cold, wet and windy conditions to ensure the rest of us can race. So, on behalf of all Centurions, I would like to say a big thank you to our very own Centurion officials who do the recording, timekeeping and marshalling.

Among notable achievements by Centurions: Dom King (C1098) qualified for 2016 Rio Olympic Games but sadly Dom was DQ'd. (well, it happens...) But to get there is such an honour. Well done Dom!

Centurions also participated in many 24 hour races in France, Belgium and the Netherlands. Bourges, Chateau Thierry, Wadelincourt, Schiedam. ...

In the Continental Centurions 100 miles/24 hours race held in Schiedam there was success for Centurions Sandra Brown and Richard McChesney (24 hours) and for the many Manx walkers (and existing Dutch walkers)



in the 100 miles: winner Vinny Lynch IoM VAC; 2nd Michael Bonney; 3rd Robbie Callister IOM Vets; 4th Jantinus Meints RWV; 5th and 1st Lady Janette Morgan IOM VAC; 6th Frank van der Gulik LAT.

In June, Suzanne Beardsmore completed the prestigious Paris Alsace (formerly Paris Colmar) - an amazing performance - well done Suzanne; in October, the British W65 record for 6 days went to Captain, Kathy Crilley. New Zealander and British Centurion, Richard McChesney broke the NZ 48 hour ad 500km record.

Centurions Cath Duhig, Ian Richards and Ed Shillabeer took honours in the World Vets held in Perth, Australia.

Many Centurions also participated in the 100th Nijmegen 4 day Marches and the Nijmegen to Rotterdam 100 miles walk.

Closer to home, it was good to see plenty of Centurions in the top finishers in the Parish Walk held in the Isle of Man in June. First home was Richard Gerrard and 1st Lady was Karen Chiarello. In fact there were loads of Centurions in the top 20 as well: James Quirk, Bernie Johnson, Karen Lawrie, Tony Mackintosh, Jayne Farquhar.... It really is good to see that there are so many enthusiastic race walkers - especially the long distance/ultra variety alive and well on the island.

And what of our overseas Centurions?

The organisation of the US Centurions has been taken over by Erin and Dave Talcott, but thanks must go to Centurion Ulrich Kamm for his support over the years.
